Membership Relations – Hilary Salanky

We have had an amazing year with an outstanding new member class. Membership Relations hosted their spring 2015 Prospective Social at the Walter Cronkite Memorial that was sponsored by the Craig School of Business. After having our summer social at the home of Ashley Matthias and having constant contact with prospective members, we were able to recruit 20 members to the New Member Class of 2015. We provided a New Member Retreat for the new members in August to acclimate them with some of our Junior League basics. We felt like this helped the new members feel better prepared for the first general membership meeting and for the year. Once the League year officially started, we held tours and provided volunteer opportunities at Cinderella's Closet (August), United Way (September), Habitat for Humanity ReStore (October), and Parents as Teachers (December). I kept constant communication with the new members through email and through our New Member page on Facebook. The New Member class created a plan at the Cinderella's Closet meeting and presented it to the board at the November Board Meeting. They then began to carry out their assigned tasks and participated in giveaway days for Cinderella's Closet in November, March, and April. Voter registration drives were held February 27th at the Cinderella's Closet fashion show at East Hills Mall from 1:00 to 7:00 pm, March 19th from 11:00 am-5:00 pm at Apple Market on Belt and Frederick and April 26th at the Children's Fair.

On Wednesday, February 17th, 11 members of The League traveled to Jefferson City, Mo., to meet with the Springfield and Kansas City Junior Leagues, and Northwest Missouri legislators. They began their day meeting with Senator Maria Chappell Nadel from St. Louis County. Senator Chappelle Nadal is currently running for a Missouri U.S. Senate seat. This meeting provided inspiration from a female leader who is working for the benefit of women and children of all races and socio-economic backgrounds. The Junior League of Missouri groups were announced on the House floor. Members were also able to meet with Representative Pat Conway. Their luncheon was held at Madison's Cafe with Justice Mary Russell as their guest speaker. Justice Russell continued to inspire the group with stories of her climb to leadership as a female. They ended the day with a tour of the Missouri Supreme Courthouse.

This year, we hosted our second annual Pony Express half marathon and fourth annual 5K run. It was well received, and we got lots of positive feedback about the race. We grew the race this year with many new additions. We started a new charitable partnership with the United Way of Greater St. Joseph and gained many new business sponsors. We accomplished this by bringing a bigger focus and appreciation to the race volunteers and encouraging community members to cheer racers on with our Pony Express Porch Party contest.
